Place & Time: Los Angeles, Tomorrow

The play runs approximately 90 minutes and is performed without intermission.

ABOUT THE TEXT

This production is loosely based on an idea expressed in the avant-garde opera The Name of Oedipus: Song of the Forbidden Body by French author Helene Cixous. In this work there are three Jocastas and three Oedipus's. It is composed of extensive arias and choral pieces exploring the Oedipus myth from a radical feminist perspective. Cixous suggests a Jocasta who is well aware of her lover-son's identity but who is so in love and so unwilling to bow to convention that she refuses to give him up. She tries, without success, to protect him from the knowledge that she knows will make their love no longer possible. It's largely an argument that the Oedipus story represents a male cultural dominance that creates taboos and mythologies that deprive women of their natural power and sexuality. It challenges what is considered to be the "normal" relationship of the body to unconscious desire and presents Jocasta as "the mother who exults in orgasm." All of the Jocasta material used in this production is quoted from arias sung by the various Jocastas in Cixous's opera. The rest of the text, with the exception of a few dozen lines from two choral passages in the "The White Road" and "Being and Nothingness" scenes in the opera, has been written specifically for City Garage.

It is the latest in a series of experiments we've been trying here. The idea is to surround core material from one author by more extensive original material created for City Garage. You might describe it as "cross-textual dialogue." It's a way of encountering a text that deconstructs it, argues with it, experiments with it, adds to it, and ultimately presents in a method that expresses the ideas and interests that we've been exploring at City Garage for some time now. We have done it in our productions of Heiner Müller in MedeaText: Los Angeles/Despoiled Shore, and in Frederick of Prussia/GeorgeW's Dream of Sleep. This piece has been created in the same vein: taking the work of a prominent European avant-garde writer and encountering it in a way that would bring it into our immediate cultural landscape of contemporary Los Angeles.

The Oedipus myth, quite naturally, takes us into a dark and mysterious place in the human psyche. Why do we want what we want? This piece explores that fundamental confusion and does so within the language and modes of expression of our current culture: a time of increasing fragmentation and isolation, a time when the pornographic image has more power than the human body, a time when the computer speaks more loudly than the human voice. The city of this Oedipus is afflicted by the seduction of its own chatter. When he finally ventures forth to redeem both it and himself he finds himself shouting into a silence that defeats him. There is a new beast that reigns in the desert city, a beast that asks its own inexplicable riddles, the beast of self-absorption and selfconsumption. This beast enforces its own new world order: the terrible loneliness of a so-called information age in which everything is said but nothing understood, where everything is obtainable, but nothing is desirable, and where the human hunger for love ultimately turns inward to feed only upon itself.

Jocasta

Maureen has appeared in theatre all over the U.S. and Canada and throughout Europe. Her most notable performance was in Oh, Calcutta! on Broadway in which she danced a nude pas de deux. She previously appeared in The Presidents, Frederick of Prussia/GeorgeW's Dream of Sleep, The Gertrude Stein Project, The Girl In The Flammable Skirt, and Katzelmacher at City Garage and is happy to once again be working with Frederique Michel.

Simon Burzynski

Oedipus

Simon was born in Poland and moved to the United States as a boy. He holds a B.A. in theatre from Central Washington University (Ellensburg, WA) and an M.F.A. in acting from UC Davis. Since moving to Los Angeles in the spring, Simon has been playing the parts of Spiderman and Daredevil at Universal Studios Hollywood. This is his first play with City Garage.

Tina Fallon

Internet Lady

This is Tina's first production at City Garage. She received her B.A. in Theatre Arts from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona. She has appeared as Molly in The Mousetrap and was lucky enough to twice play Estragon in Waiting for Godot. In 1986 and 1989 she participated in the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.

Frederíque Michel, Artistic Director

Director

Frederique was born in Paris and studied theatre at the Conservatoire. She has directed more than eighty productions in the United States, including works by Strindberg, Rozewicz, Vinaver, Horowitz, Fornes and Barker. She received a Dramalogue award for her direction of Dissident, and has led the company as Artistic Director since its founding in 1987. Her 1998 production of George Sand: An Erotic Odyssey in Seven Tableaux was nominated for four L.A. Weekly Theater Awards, including Best Director. She was nominated again for Best Director for MedeaText: Los Angeles/Despoiled Shore (2000).

Charles A. Duncombe, Managing Director

Playwright, Production Designer

Charles is a writer, director and designer. He began his partnership with Frederique Michel in 1985 with her production of Miss Julie, and he has designed all of her work since then. He has won two Dramalogue awards for production design and in 1999 won the L.A. Weekly Theater Award for Best Lighting Design for George Sand: An Erotic Odyssey in Seven Tableaux (1998). He was nominated for two L.A. Weekly awards for MedeaText: Los Angeles/Despoiled Shore (2000): Best Adaptation, and Best Set. He was nominated again for two L.A. Weekly awards for Frederick of Prussia/GeorgeW's Dream of Sleep (2001): Best Adaptation, and Production Design.

Mathew Gifford

Assistant Director

Born and raised in rural Minnesota, Mathew graduated from St. John's University (the one with the monks) with degrees in Economics & French. He then moved to Cannes, France where he became the first American to be selected to attend L'ERAC, a private, government-funded acting school.
